## Responsibilities

I was mainly responsible for checking and changing lures for Codling Moth and Leaf Roller traps. I also was in charge of crop count estimates. For that I had to make sure that an average of the crop was counted in each block. I had to make sure that four large, four medium, and four small trees were counted in every block, and the data were put into a spread sheet. I also got a chance to work in typical orchard work.



This is the type of trap I was checking, and the gator on the right was the gator that I used for transportation to get around the farms to check all the traps. Each trap was checked weekly, and lures were changed every four weeks for leaf roller, and every six weeks for codling moth.
